






Dear brother Knights,

I hope you are all having a good Lent! This 40 day journey is a truly wonderful opportunity to grow spiritually. And we have the support of all Catholics all over the world who are walking the same path with us! Lent began as a 40 day retreat for those within the early church who were preparing for baptism. One of the early popes made the decision that the 40 day retreat had such a good effect on the catechumens that now we all will do it!

I think the Catholic Church truly SHINES every year during Holy Week! The Catholic Church stops its regular routine and tries with special emphasis to WALK THE WAY WITH JESUS. We begin on Palm Sunday when we recall His triumphant entrance into the holy city of Jerusalem. At the beginning of the Mass we proclaim the added "Palm Gospel." We also prayerfully read the Passion Narrative in different voices to bring it alive.

Then we begin what is called the holiest days of the year, the Pascal Triduum, when we celebrate the suffering, death and resurrection of Christ. This event is the center of human history! At the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, we celebrate the great gift of the Eucharist. We reenact Jesus' washing of the feet of his apostles during the Last Supper. It ends with a Eucharistic procession, taking the Eucharist out of the tabernacle and into a place of repose until midnight. This recalls Christ's walk to the. Garden of Gethsemane where in His agony He sweat blood. People come and go praying in this impromptu chapel.

There is no Mass throughout the Catholic Church, funeral or otherwise, until the Easter celebration at the Easter Vigil to recall when Christ died and was taken from us.

Then on Good Friday, we celebrate the liturgy of the Lord's Passion at 3pm which according to the Gospels is the hour when Jesus died on the cross for us. We read the account of the Passion from John's Gospel in different voices, we venerate the cross and we receive communion. Also, we have Stations of the Cross in the evening.

On Holy Saturday, we celebrate the Easter Vigil beginning after sunset. This beautiful and greatest Mass of the year centers on the Easter candle. We have the beautiful Easter Proclamation called the Exultet (Rejoice) in Latin. We have a selection of readings, recalling, how everything from the creation of the world lead up to the resurrection of Jesus. It is a time to bring the converts into the church and celebrate the sacraments Baptism and Confirmation. This year we again have a large group of adults and teens, 40 people who will join the Church and celebrate the sacraments.

At all the Easter Masses, we profess our baptismal promises and are sprinkled with holy water symbolizing our baptism. The whole process of spiritual growth that began on Ash Wednesday culminates when we profess our promises of baptism over again at the Easter Mass. It is the conclusion of the conversion process that began on Ash Wednesday!

The whole church and every parish all over the world walks the way with Jesus during Holy Week! It is a magnificent expression of faith, and of trying to take these days seriously in order to enter more deeply into the salvation that the Lord won for us!

May all of us walk that way with Jesus on Holy Week this year and so be more filled with the new life and joy of Easter!

Prior to the March Council Meeting, Lisa Morrelli President of the Parents/Guardian Association of the Coastal Center explained that provide 24/7 care to adults with special needs. They are one of five such facilities in the state. The local facility currently cares for 139 residents with additional space for a total of 145.



Following the briefing from Lisa, GK Tim and PGK Tom Bloomer presented Lisa and co-worker Kalen Milford with a donation of \$2,000.00 from the special needs fund generated by last year's golf tournament.





One of the groups that our council supports with donations from the State Raffle is the Women's Kairos Prison Ministry of SC.

"Your financial and prayerful support of the Kairos Inside Program allows volunteers to establish a Christian Community "Inside" the prison by the transforming love and forgiveness of Jesus Christ. This is a four day program of talks, discussions, chapel meditations, music, laughter, tears and love. Currently, there are about 700 women incarcerated at Camille Griffin Graham Correctional Institution in Columbia, SC.

Team Formation Meetings are essential to prepare the Kairos volunteers who will be going into the prison. Thirty two Christian women met for four training sessions from January 18th thru March 8th to prepare them for the various roles they'll be fulfilling on the inside.

<u>Habitat</u> Brother Knights gathered at 459 Reneau in Summerville for a work detail. Activities included cleaning out the drain ditch on the property line and cut tress in the ditch. Workeers included Nathan Hobbs, Noash Hobbs, Brad Jones, Doug Nowik and Sal Patti.

Mepkin Abbey The Knights had great representation at the four day Mepkin Abbey work project. Along with students from the University of Louisville and Carroll University (Wisconsin), the group cleared the stream area and varnished the bridge to the Meditation Garden of Truth & Reconciliation and totally cleaned the largest chicken coop on the premises. FYI, when the Monks were selling eggs, this coop housed 20,000 chickens and overall there were 70,000 chickens at Mepkin. Over the workdays 3,700 pounds of metal were cleared and sorted which generated over \$1,700 for the Abbey. Special shoutout to Bert Bulalacao for coordinating our Knights team as well as Hank Chardos who has coordinated this effort for years and will now be devoting all his time to Birthright of Charlotte which he founded.

Albert Bellacicco SUMMERVILLE - It is with heavy hearts that we announce the passing of Albert (Al) Bellacicco, 95, of Summerville, husband of Elaine Bellacicco. He passed away Thursday, March 20, 2025 at the Ralph H. Johnson Veteran's Hospital. Albert was born December 12, 1929 in Highland, NY to Mary and John Bellacicco, who immigrated to the United States from Italy in 1906. He enlisted in the US Air Force in 1950 and served 30 years retiring as a Chief Master Sergeant. He enjoyed gardening, reading, and playing games with his family. In addition to his wife of 71 years, Al is survived by his four sons and three daughters. Al had nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren. He is also survived by two brothers. A Memorial Service will be held Wednesday, March 26, 2025 at 10:30 am at St. John the Beloved Catholic Church in Summerville, SC. Joseph O'Callahan

Joseph Timothy O'Callahan was born on May 14, 1905 to Cornelius and Alice (Casey) O'Callahan; he was one of 6 children. He grew up in the Roxbury neighborhood of Boston MA. Shortly after graduating from Boston College High School in 1922, he joined the Jesuit Order. He spent the next 13 years in Jesuit formation at St. Andew's College in Poughkeepsie, NY, where he received a B.A. in 1925 and a M.A. in 1929, specializing in Mathematics and Physics, along with Religious Philosophy. He was ordained a Jesuit priest in 1934.

From 1929 to 1937 O'Callahan was a Professor of Mathematics, Philosophy and Physics at Boston College. He spent one year as a Professor of Philosophy at Weston Jesuit School of Theology (1937-8) and then he served as Director of the Mathematics Department at the College of the Holy Cross in Worchester MA from 1938 to 1940.

In 1940, with the War raging in Europe, Father O'Callahan shocked his colleagues by enlisting in the Navy Reserves. He was 36 years old, far more academic than athletic, near-sighted with a bad case of claustrophobia and high blood pressure. He told his friends that "he wanted to comfort the kids who would be going to war". One friend reasoned, "Let somebody younger help those boys. You can't even open your umbrella". Nevertheless, he was appointed a Lieutenant (junior grade) in the Chaplain Corps of the U.S. Navy Reserve on August 7, 1940 and assigned to the Naval Air Station in Pensacola, FL.

His first assignment at sea was on the USS Ranger. He participated in Operation Torch, the April 1942 amphibious conquest of French Morocco; and in Operation Leader, the October 1943 raid on German shipping in Norwegian waters. He later served at Naval Air Stations in Alameda, CA, and Pearl Harbor, HI. Throughout his Navy assignments, Father O'Callahan advanced progressively in rank.

prayed over them Essex-Class aircraft carrier commissioned in January 1943. It was deployed in the Pacific Fleet patrolling the South China Sea. The Franklin was part of a Task Force assigned to locate and destroy enemy vessels that were scattered throughout the inland waters around Japan. At that time U.S. planes totally dominated the skies; this was a mop-up exercise.

March 19th (1945) began like most days: before each flight of planes left the carrier, Father O'Callahan would visit the various pilot ready rooms, praying with the men and giving them general absolution.

The Franklin was only about 50 miles off the coast of Japan, near the City of Kobe. The previous day, U.S. pilots did not locate the enemy ships until just before dark. Today they would strike them. The first wave of planes left the Franklin about 5:30 AM and the second wave of planes was ready on the flight deck, fueled and loaded with rockets and bombs. Shortly after 7 am, a lone Japanese Kamikaze dive bomber broke through the cloud cover and made a low-level run at the Franklin, dropping 2 550 lb. bombs on the Franklin's flight deck, slightly forward of the ship's "island". Both bombs tore through the flight deck to the hangar deck below, where there were 22 more planes being readied: 16 were fully-fueled and 5 were fully armed. The Kamikaze's bombs set off massive explosions and fires on both decks.

The 31 planes on the flight deck were immediately engulfed in flames, and their ordinance began exploding. The aircraft fuselages melted and rivers of burning fuel from the flight deck ran down into the hangar deck. The hangar deck became an inferno of exploding gas tanks and ammunition. Fortunately, armor plating shielded the ships innards – in particular the boilers and steering plant - from destruction.

Of the 3,400 sailors on board the Franklin, about 1,000 were seriously burned, horribly injured or killed instantly. Close to 1,000 more sailors were thrown or jumped into the water. The blasts killed the damage-control team and many key officers and disabled much of the fire-fighting equipment. For the next 5 hours dozens of secondary explosions continued as ammunition "cooked off".

Nearby ships rushed to the burning carrier, picking up the crew members in the water. Two of the ships placed their own hulls against the Franklin to allow more of her crew to escape. Yet hundreds of sailors remained on the Franklin, valiantly trying to save the ship.

Chaplain O'Callahan was in a Ward Room eating French toast. Although wounded in the leg by one of the explosions, he put on his helmet with a large white cross and made his way through fire and smoke up to the flight deck, which was 90% engulfed in flames and slanted (13-degree starboard list), There were burned, mangled and bleeding bodies strewn everywhere. O'Callahan administered Last Rites to the dying and comforted and prayed over the wounded.

Realizing that the ship was dead in the water and many key officers were dead or trapped, Chaplain O'Callahan began to organize the survivors into fire-fighting hose crews and rescue teams. He noticed flames near the anti-aircraft gun turrets and led officers and crewmen to form a line to carry the hot bombs and shells to the edge of the deck and throw them overboard before they could explode. Meanwhile a 1,000 lb. bomb was rolling around the flight deck. Father O'Callahan organized a team to secure the bomb and let technicians defuse it so it could be rolled overboard.

O'Callahan recruited a damage control party and led it down into the hangar deck, which was filled with smoke, fire and exploding ordinance. The ordinance was too hot and heavy to be moved up to the flight deck and thrown overboard, so the sailors hosed down the main ammunition magazines to cool them down and prevent them from exploding,

By 7:30 AM, Rear Admiral Davison, the Commander of the Franklin's Task Group, left the Bridge and transferred to a destroyer, concluding that the Franklin was lost. He recommended that Franklin Captain Gehres do the same. By 9:30 AM the ammunition for the Franklin's aft 5-inch anti-aircraft guns exploded. "Whole aircraft engines with propellers attached, debris of all description, including pieces of human bodies, were flung high in the air and descended on the area like hail on a roof," said flight deck officer, Commander Steven Jurika.

An eyewitness later recalled: "He (Father O'Callahan) seemed to be everywhere, handling hoses, organizing fire-fighting and rescue parties, helping to carry hot bombs and shells to the edge of the deck, and doing everything he could to save our ship". The ship's Captain, Leslie Gehres, watched from the Bridge. He later testified that Chaplain O'Callahan was "the bravest man I ever saw".

By 10 AM, the engine and steering rooms were so hot that the men working there had to flee their stations. The Franklin was dead in the water only 50 miles from the shores of Japan. Then 6 more live 1000 lb. bombs were rolling around the flight deck. Hose crews cooled the bombs so they could be defused and pushed overboard.

Despite the deaths and damage, the Captain and remaining crew fought to save the Franklin. The heavy cruiser Pittsburgh was able to attach a towline to the Franklin a little after 1 PM. By sunset the fires had been beaten back or extinguished and crewmen were able to return to the boiler room. By 10 PM, one of the boilers was lit and running. The Franklin's engines began slowly turning and the tow speed increased to 6 knots. Additional boilers were brought on line and by 12:30 PM the next afternoon, the tow line was dropped and the Franklin was moving under its own power. During the night the Franklin was able to increase its speed to 18 knots and the crew got the gyro compasses, search radar, phones and some of the carrier's guns working again.

As conditions aboard the ship improved, the enlisted men and officers were left with the grisly task of disposing of the dead bodies. O'Callahan and Protestant Chaplain Gatlin held a brief prayer service for each man before they were buried at sea, a task which took several days to complete. The damaged Franklin was attacked several times by enemy planes, but avoided more damage thanks to effective Navy air support and a little luck, The Franklin finally made it to Pearl Harbor. A total of 807 men had been killed and 487 wounded on the Franklin.

Chaplain O'Callahan was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Commander in July 1945. He was awarded a Navy Silver Cross, but he declined it, stating that the publicity he received was exaggerated. He said, "Any priest in like circumstances should do and would do what I did." But President Truman learned about Father O'Callahan's heroism and upgraded the Award to the Congressional Medal of Honor. O'Callahan tried to decline that Medal also, but President Truman convinced Father O'Callahan to receive it. The Presentation was made at the White House on January 23, 1946. Father O'Callahan was the first **Navy** Chaplain to receive the Medal of Honor.

Franklin crew member Lieutenant (junior grade) Donald A. Gray also received the Congressional Medal of Honor. He was trapped below deck with some 300 crew men. As an engineer, he knew the layout of the ship and groped his way through several dark, smoke and debris-filled corridors until he discovered an escape route. He made three trips back to the trapped men and led every one of the 300 men to safety.

When Father O'Callahan was released from active duty in November 1946, he returned to Holy Cross College as a Professor of Philosophy. He retired from the Naval Reserves in 1953 as a Captain. Later an illness made him an invalid. Father O'Callahan died on March 18, 1964 and is buried in the Jesuit cemetery on the Holy Cross campus.

On July 21, 1965, the USS O'Callahan, a Destroyer Escort vessel, was christened by Sister Rose Marie O'Callahan, Father Joseph's younger sister.

Two movies depict Father O'Callahan's heroics aboard the USS Franklin: "The Ship That Would Not Die" released in 1945 and narrated by Gene Kelly; and "Battle Stations" released in 1956 narrated by James Cagney. Father O'Callahan also published a best-selling memoir in 1956 called "I was Chaplain on the Franklin".

In addition to belonging to a select group of Medal of Honor recipients, Father O'Callahan was a member of many leading scientific societies, including the American Physical Society, the American Mathematical Society, the Mathematical Association, the American Statistical Society, the Association of Mathematical Statistics, the Association of Jesuit Scientists and the Jesuit Philosophical Society.
